### **Invasive Strike Team**

Wilson Montgomery, a dedicated Grand Prairie Friends volunteer and Warbler Ridge Champion, saw the need for additional time targeted at removing woody invasive plants at Warbler Ridge. Invasive species such as bush honeysuckle and multiflora rose can outcompete desirable native species, which is counteractive to our restoration goals.

To address this need, Wilson worked with us to form the Invasive Strike Team. The first workday was July 16, 2022. Since then, Wilson has led a group of volunteers to combat invasive species on the third Saturday of each month. All are welcome to come join him!

### **Bat Monitoring Updates**

Efforts to protect and expand endangered bat populations on our properties is entering its fifth year with strong, measurable success. At the Warbler Ridge Conservation Area, data captured by volunteer citizen scientists showed continued high usage of the artificial bat habitat by the federally endangered Indiana Bat. Analysis by University of Illinois bat researchers has confirmed there is at least one maternity colony in the South Pod. Over 700 bats were counted exiting the pods on one evening in July!

In 2023, artificial habitat was also installed at the Burnett Land and Water Reserve.

Many thanks to the Illinois Natural History Survey and the Illinois Bat Conservation Program, who conducted the original bat survey and continue to help us with our ongoing conservation efforts.

### **Restoring the Historic Embarras River's Wooded Corridor**

With help from our dedicated volunteers, we continue to help restore the vital woodland corridor that once lined the Embarras River. This important north-south wildlife 'highway' will become even more vital as the climate changes and species small and large must find pathways northward.

- Warbler Ridge floodplain restoration; 3,150 trees planted in 2023! Adding to the thousands that have already been planted over the last several years.
- Burnett Land & Water Reserve: 27,000 trees planted!

Species included: Black Walnut, Shellbark Hickory, Bur Oak, Hardy Pecan, Shumard Oak, White Oak, and others.









# The Ellen Baranowski Forever Fund

Ellen Baranowski had always been drawn to nature and this was evident in the way she lived. She spent time kayaking, creating art inspired by nature, and showcasing the joy of the natural world with others. As a teacher, she strove to instill that love of nature in her students through her curriculum.

Beyond experiencing the richness and wonder of the world for herself, Ellen sought to preserve the beauty of the environment through her service as a volunteer at many central IL natural areas.

This heart of stewardship was reflected in a generous gift given to Grand Prairie Friends in her honor. With this kind gift, The Ellen Baranowski Forever Fund was established. This fund is a donorrestricted long-term investment account designed to ensure perpetual stewardship of Grand Prairie Friends lands.

This Ellen Baranowski Forever Fund was officially announced in February 2023 at the showing of The Magic Stump documentary. As the movie highlights the history and importance of Illinois' Grand Prairie region, this viewing was the perfect opportunity to unveil a fund dedicated to preserving this unique landscape and its unique blend of plants and animals.

### The Magic Stump

The Magic Stump is a birding documentary that showcases the story of a special tree stump in Coles Counity, IL that draws overwintering raptor species, including two prairie falcons.

Grand Prairie Friends had the honor of supporting the making of this film and hosting a special viewing at the Virginia Theater that included a Q&A with the filmmaker, Bob Dolgan, and other key people featured in the documentary.

This event drew a remarkable crowd of over 500 people, all gathered to share in learning and celebrating Illinois land conservation.





# Forever Remembered at Mark's Point

Stan Herrin and Mark Bokenkamp shared a true and enduring friendship, forged through time spent enjoying the natural world along the Embarras River.

Stan and Mark grew up together in Champaign, IL and

bonded over their shared passions for nature and scouting. When the pair attended Eastern Illinois University for college, they continued their explorations together along the Embarras River. After college, they returned to the land periodically and continued their adventures as their friendship grew.

The dedication ceremony was a celebration of life and memories shared by Mark's wife, Janet Marsano, Stan Herrin, and his wife Elizabeth Small as they shared with guests who came from across the U.S. Led by Stan Herrin's welcome, they shared memories and were treated to tours of the Mark's Point area, which now stands as a testament to both nature and friendship.



### **Forever Ours: Prospect Cemetery Prairie Nature Preserve**

After many years of faithfully stewarding this historic tallgrass prairie remnant gem, GPF now officially owns Prospect Cemetery Prairie Nature Preserve in Paxton!

At the fall 2022 membership meeting, many of you joined us as we held a ribbon cutting onsite to celebrate this momentous achievement.

Bob Reber speaks passionately about Prospect Prairie. As a child, he and his father would explore the grounds, his father sharing the names of all the plants. Now, he has the opportunity to share

the wonder of Prospect Prairie with his children and grandchildren—an endeavor that he strongly believes in.

To Bob, the prairie is also a window to the history and wisdom of the land. He states, "Once you get to appreciate prairies and how they developed, it gives you a sense of who we are, how we got here, and how to plan for the future."

### **Bonnie's Prairie Nature Preserve**

Bonnie's Prairie Nature Preserve near Watseka, IL is GPF's northern-most property. It includes the only sand pond and wet sand prairie protected as a nature preserve in east-central Illinois.

In our work to protect this unique ecosystem, we removed brush and weedy trees and planted one acre of specialized sand prairie seed mix. This was done through a specialized grant from One Tree Planted.

### Warbler Bluff Hill Prairie & Seep Restoration

Warbler Bluff is a high quality woodland that also includes an open hillside where soil had been scraped many years ago to use as fill in the construction of a bridge over the Embarras River.

The excavation exposed significant areas of groundwater seepage that were incorporated into a planting plan to convert the upper two-thirds of the hillside into a hill prairie and planting the seepage areas with plant species typical of fens. The lower portion of the slope and the flat area at the base were reforested with a variety of native hardwoods and understory species.

Eight species of canopy trees and five species of understory trees were included in the planting. Plugs of fen species such as Riddell's goldenrod, swamp aster, autumn sneezeweed, and

tussock sedge were planted. Later, prairie forb species were sown on the dryer well-drained portions of the hillside.

- Seep Plants: 2,205 plants (27 species) specific to fen wetlands
- Hill Prairie Seeding: 34 species
- Trees Planted: 131 trees (13 species)



#### What is a Seep?

A seep is a wetland formed where water flows through limestone out onto the earth's surface, resulting in an alkaline pH. A variety of unique plants are adapted to thriving in these conditions.

### **The Fallen Outdoors Hunting Program for Wounded Veterans**

Navy veteran Ashtin Bader has long enjoyed the skills and quietness involved with archery, an interest that led her to become a bowhunter a few years ago. Now, she is a volunteer with The Fallen Outdoors, which works to help veterans find healing from depression, post-traumatic stress disorder, loneliness, and other issues.

Grand Prairie Friends now has a new partnership with The Fallen Outdoors at Warbler Ridge Conservation Area, where nine veterans took part in a 15-day bow hunt in fall 2023.

GPF has opened Warbler Ridge to public-access hunting for four years now through the Illinois Department of Natural Resources' Illinois Recreational Access Program (IRAP) for privately-owned land. Welcoming The Fallen Outdoors this year has helped relieve the pressure caused by the large number of deer on the conservation area's plant life.

### Celebrating 25 Years: Rattlesnake Master Run for the Prairie

The inaugural Rattlesnake Master Run for the Prairie was hosted in 1997. This event, aimed at fundraising and increasing awareness of prairie conservation, was founded by Dave Monk. In 2005, as the race changed leadership, Grand Prairie Friends became the beneficiary of this fundraiser.

Since then, the Rattlesnake Master Run and Grand Prairie Friends have become inextricably associated, and the race remains one of our biggest annual fundraisers. In 2012, we saw the biggest year, with more than 300 runners.

Through course changes, hundreds of runners, and countless volunteers, the Rattlesnake Master Run continues to thrive to this day.

In 2023, we celebrated our 25th annual race. Volunteers and runners alike enjoyed the beautiful November morning. We cheered on 257 race participants and welcomed them to the finish line with snacks and the music of John McMahon.

Thank you again to all our wonderful and dedicated volunteers who make this race possible every year, from course-markers to snack distributors!





### **EIU Students Take On GPF History Project**

As part of their Spring-Fall 2023 syllabus, Eastern Illinois University's Public History students, led by Dr. Camden Burd, focused on exploring the "roots" of Illinois' tallgrass prairie.

Students combined guest speakers, research, interviews, onsite prairie tours and 40 years-worth of archival



document review to create exhibits and research essays on GPF's role in Illinois' prairie legacy.

By mid-spring 2024, students will open their prairie research exhibit in EIU Booth Library. Stay tuned for an invitation to view their valuable work.


