Sweet Connections with Nance Woods

This valentine month, GPF received a "sweet" note from new GPF member, Amber Lake. I quickly forwarded the note to Paul Nance, son to Nance Woods donors (2001), Jean & Jim Nance. From there, the note became even "sweeter" as Paul shared stories of his family heritage at the site. Grand Prairie Friends is honored to own and manage the 14acre Nance Woods property in perpetuity, plan a spring hike and visit.

Amber Lake: "I wanted to drop a note to let you know the rather hard to ignore coincidental way I came across this organization.

"Several months back, I had become interested in tapping the maple trees on our property to make a little maple syrup. I marked all of my maples before fall and asked my husband for a beginner's maple tapping kit and the book called The Encyclopedia of Country Living for Christmas. He delivered on both.

"As I read through the pages of this massive book I finally came upon the section of tapping maple trees. To my surprise and astonishment in the text of this massive book was a maple syrup making tip from a woman from my tiny town of Neoga, Illinois, her name was Jean Nance. I was floored that someone else around here had the same interest. However, I had never heard of this woman and this book is old, this was the 50th anniversary edition, after all.

"I tried to look her up with no results. Then, I came across an article on your website with her name, Jean Nance- James Nance Woods. I was again astonished to find that the 14-acre plot she donated to Grand Prairie Friends was only a couple miles from my home.

"After some reflection and mentioning this chain of coincidences to friends I just had to wonder if this was a bit of divine intervention. I'm almost certain the story doesn't end here.

"As a lover of the outdoors as well as being keen to the funny little things life gives us sometimes, I just wanted to share with you how I came to know Grand Prairie Friends."

Paul Nance: "Hi Amber, I am one of Jean and Jim Nance's four children. Mom and Dad bought 80-acres near Neoga (including open fields and the woodland) in the 1960s. Dad had dreamed of creating a tallgrass prairie, and he slowly began planting native plants in the open fields. They moved to "New Prairie Farm" in the mid-1970s, built a house and lived there for about a decade. Dad continued to expand his prairie plantings, until by the time they left it was quite magnificent.

"They kept bees and chickens, and briefly owned two Scotch Highland cows and a bull. I don't remember how many years they maple sugared, but the family benefited many times from samples of their product. I've attached four pictures of the sugaring operation. That's Dad, tapping trees and tending the fire to reduce the sap. As I remember, one year they tried to boil down the sap in the house, and everything was covered with a fine layer of sticky film!"

The white oak tree can be found presiding over pastures, as well as, providing shade in urban neighborhoods. Its broad-spreading crown is impressive when young and improves with age. The leaves are a true-green in color, deeply lobed, and the blond bark is deeply ridged with furrows. The tight grained wood from this tree is used to make whiskey barrels!
