# Railroad Right-of Ways & Cemeteries: Where GPF Prairie Management Lives









As many Midwestern prairie enthusiasts know, original remnant prairies have a close partnership with cemeteries and railroads. These natural areas were often the sections left undisturbed by the plow and as a result, they hold some of our most important prairie remnants.

Four of Grand Prairie Friends' preserves, Loda, Prospect, Fairchild and Warbler Ridge, include cemeteries. The Loda Cemetery Prairie Nature Preserve is a 14 -

acre natural area which surrounds the Pine View Cemetery. GPF Railroad prairies include Shortline Railroad Prairie just outside of Gifford. It was the desire to preserve Shortline Prairie that first began the Grand Prairie Friends organization back in 1984. Just to the north, Paxton Railroad Prairie hosts the Prairie Cicada in the deep heat of July.

On June 20, GPF organized an educational tour for East-Central Illinois Master Naturalists to better understand the origin and current-day work involved in prairie restoration, which included visits to our cemetery and railroad sites. Longtime stewards and volunteers including Mary Kay Solecki, Bob Reber, John Griesbaum and Beckie Green shared their knowledge to show that there is certainly a lot of life in these cemeteries.

# TREE-mendous Planting Season The Spring of 24,000!









Yes! You read that correctly, 24,000 trees have been planted over the last few months at Grand Prairie Friends' Warbler Ridge Conservation Area in Charleston.

As part of the on-going bat habitat restoration, our friends at Eco Logic Restoration started in the deep months of winter to plant a combination of 22,000 containerized and bare root hickories and oaks. These are adjacent to the new artificial bat habitat structures in the north bottoms area of Warbler Ridge.

As the season progressed, we changed gears to our south field in the Warbler Bottoms area. For this project, our restoration team at Forest Resources Restoration stepped in and planted 1,500 big beautiful containerized native trees along with a 10-acre monarch pollinator planting! The field is already alive with blooming trees, making our bees and butterflies very happy. As with all of our projects, deer management is an essential component of our work and will continue to evolve as the plantings progress.

Thanks to a donation of oak trees from Living Lands & Waters, GPF held our finale to

the tree planting season on April 16. On this morning, a dedicated team of GPF volunteers hand-planted 500 bur oak trees to various new homes throughout the preserve. A TREE-mendous season, indeed.
